Welcome to the first Langford Attendance Newsletter of the 2023-24 academic year! 😊



This term has been challenging with illness across the school but, on behalf of everyone at Langford, I would like to say a huge congratulations to the **46 children** with **100% attendance** this term! A special well done to Dolphin and Turtle class who have the most amount of pupils with 100% attendance (9 in total!). That is a huge achievement! We also have **123 children** who achieved **over 97% attendance** this term- well done to all those pupils!

As a school, our target is 97% attendance. We are currently at 93.18% which means we are a little behind where we want to be, unfortunately.

What to do if your child is unable to attend school

Frequent absence will impact on your child's learning, both academically and socially. If your child is unable to attend school, **you must phone or email the school office, or report your child's absence via Parentmail before 9.05 am every day they are unwell.** You can leave a message to inform us of the absence. If we do not hear from you, we will contact you to update us on your child's absence. If we cannot contact you, the absence will be recorded as **unauthorised**. Repeated unauthorised absences can lead to penalty notices.

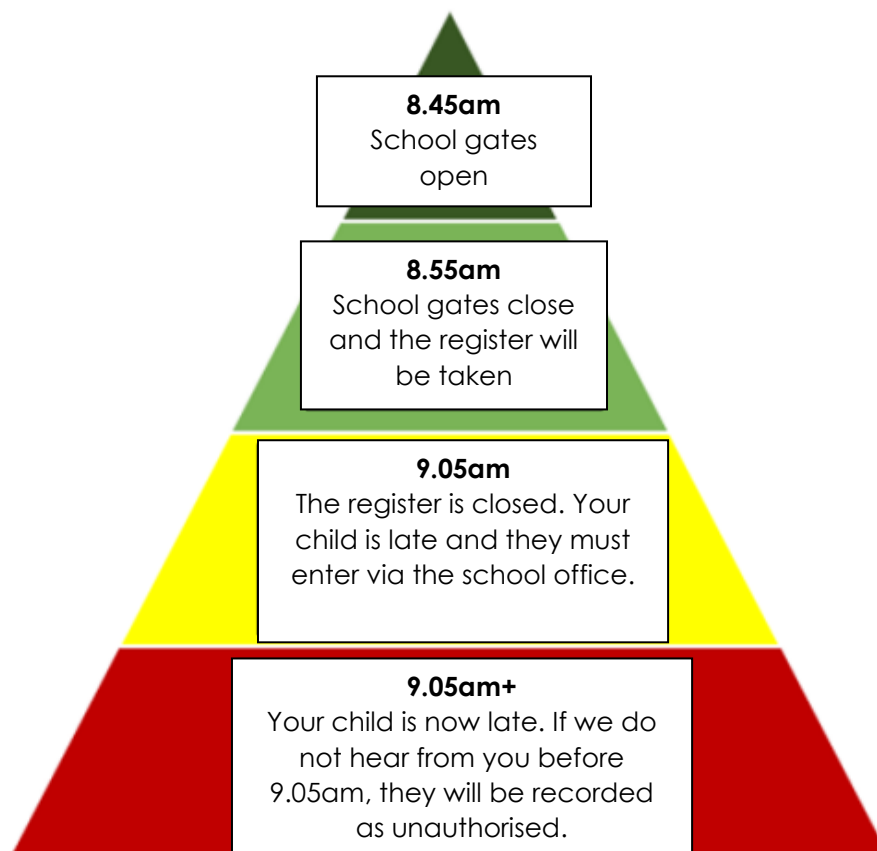
All absences are transferred to the Local Authority so if we are concerned about your child's attendance, you will be invited into school to discuss this further.

Punctuality

Our school gates open at 8.45 am and if your child is not in class by 9.05am, they will be recorded at late. Since the start of the term, we have had

56 different children arrive to school late, with over 199 late marks (after the register has closed).

This accounts for vast amounts of lost learning.



Does it really matter if a child is late?

Being late has a big impact on a child:

- It can hinder their social development
- It is detrimental to their learning, particularly if they are missing the same key session each day (Maths, Phonics and Spelling)
- It impacts their whole class attendance and the rewards they receive
- Over time it builds up- 15 minutes late every day is the equivalent of missing 10 whole school days per year.
